SAFEGUARDING CHILDREN INFORMATION UPDATE - 295 9th May 2018

IICSA Interim Report (25/04/18)

The Independent Inquiry into CCSA has published its Interim Report, setting out the work of the Inquiry and progress.

The Inquiry has so far held 5 public hearings and 7 seminars and published reports setting out the findings from 2 public hearings and 9 research reports. Over 1,000 people have taken part in the Inquiry's Truth Project.

The report identifies our reluctance to discuss CSA openly and frankly and calls for this to be addressed. It identifies the lack of transparency by some leaders on failure of their institutions to protect children. This was highlighted in recent Inquiry reports into child migration programmes and specific institutions in Rochdale and has been raised by victims and survivors during the Truth Project.

Using specific contributions of victims and survivors, the report provides clear accounts of CSA and the profound and lifelong impact it has on them.

The Chair and Panel have identified steps which they consider will better protect children and have made 18 new recommendations to government, the police and others.

New support to help children living with alcohol-dependent parents (23/04/18)

New plans announced by Health and Social Care Secretary Jeremy Hunt will help identify at-risk children more quickly and provide them with rapid access to support and advice.

The package of measures is backed by £6m in joint funding from the DH and Social Care and the Department for Work and Pensions. It is designed to help an estimated 200,000 children in England living with alcohol-dependent parents.

The measures include:

- fast access to support and mental health services for children and their families where there is a dependent drinker
- quicker identification of at-risk children, including those undertaking inappropriate care responsibilities
- the provision of outreach programmes to get more parents successfully through addiction treatment
- early intervention programmes to reduce the numbers of children needing to go into care

LAs will be invited to bid for funding by coming up with innovative solutions based on local need, with priority given to areas where more children are affected. Public Health England will be responsible for working with the funded areas to monitor progress.

The package of interventions, totalling up to £6m, includes:

■ a £4.m innovation fund for LAs to develop plans that improve outcomes for children of alcohol-dependent parents

- ■£1m to fund national capacity building by non-governmental organisations
- The new funding follows government investment last year of £500,000 to expand national helplines for children with alcoholic parents.

HO wins judgment to maintain powers to keep people safe (27/04/18)

A High Court judgement, in favour of the government, upholds the lawfulness of the data retention regime in the Investigatory Powers Act. It follows a legal challenge by campaign group Liberty.

While the government had conceded that aspects of Part 4 of the IPA2016 which concerns communications data retention were inconsistent with EU law and has committed to bring forward amendments to remedy these inconsistencies, Liberty claimed that the communication data regime as a whole should be abolished.

Communications data is an essential tool for law enforcement and national security investigations. It is used to investigate crime, keep children safe, support or disprove alibis and link a suspect to a particular crime scene, amongst many other purposes.

Home Secretary, Amber Rudd, has announced a coalition of government ministers, cross-party MPs, police leaders, local government and the voluntary sector will make up the Serious Violence Taskforce – which will ensure sustained, swift and decisive action against violent crime.

Together with the government, the taskforce will help design and deliver the key commitments of the Serious Violence Strategy, working with affected communities to ensure immediate and real action is taken.

The taskforce's aim is to stop the recent increases in serious violence and see levels of violent crime reduce. It will hold the government and others to account, evaluate the strategy's impact and commission further work as commitments are delivered.

Youth justice resource pack (03/05/18)

Councils are responsible for the safety and wellbeing of all young people in their areas. In terms of youth justice, that responsibility means working with young people to prevent them from coming into the youth justice system in the first place and supporting those who do to make sure it doesn't define them, and they still have good life chances.

There are many varying and complex reasons young people may end up involved in crime. In the majority of cases, those reasons are issues that we, as LAs working with our partners, can help young people to tackle. They cover everything from difficult family relationships, to drug and alcohol misuse, to mental health issues or problems at school. When young people do get involved in crime, we need to make sure that they not only understand the impact of their offences and work to make amends but are supported to address underlying needs. Councils are not there to punish, but to protect.

Where a young person is given a custodial sentence, we also need to do all we can to make sure they are safe. While councils have no direct control over most institutions, this pack outlines some of the ways in which they can support young people in custody, and the LGA will continue to lobby the Government for improved safety in youth custodial institutions.

Modern Slavery: co-ordinated action critical to helping victims (02/05/18) The Public Accounts Committee finds Government still lacks data and systems to properly understand the crime, its victims and perpetrators.

Government does not know how much money it spends tackling modern slavery.

The Home Office introduced an ambitious Modern Slavery Strategy in 2014, but it has taken too long to learn what works in the system, to understand the complexities of the crime and to turn the strategy and the Modern Slavery Act into an effective and co-ordinated approach across government.

Government does not yet have the data or systems to understand the crime, the demographics and circumstances of the victims and the perpetrators, making the digitisation of the National Referral Mechanism (NRM) a priority.

Nor does it know how much money it spends tackling modern slavery or what success looks like, meaning it cannot establish whether its strategy is working or how it should prioritise its actions.

No minimum care standards put in place Potential victims are waiting far too long for a decision on whether they will be treated as a victim of modern slavery, causing further distress and anxiety to vulnerable people.

The Department has not put in place

minimum care standards and it does not inspect the level of care provided to potential victims, so it does not know whether or not victims are receiving adequate care.

The Department also does not know what happens to victims after they have gone through the system and whether, for example, they have been trafficked again.

SI 2018/549 - The Prison and Young Offender Institution (Amendment) Rules 2018 (01/05/18)

These Rules amend the Prison Rules 1999 (S.I. 1999/728) and the Young Offender Institution Rules 2000 (S.I. 2000/3371).

In summary, the main changes made are: to remove the requirement for the Secretary of State to approve local systems of privilege, to prohibit prisoners from smoking other than in accordance with the directions of the Secretary of State, to add some additional articles associated with smoking onto List C, and to insert a new definition of electronic cigarettes. http://www.legislation.gov.uk/uksi/2018/549/contents/made

SI 2018/540 - The Children's Homes (England) (Amendment) Regulations 2018 (30/04/18)

These Regulations amend the Children's Homes (England) Regulations 2015 (S.I. 2015/541) to amend a restriction that prevents a 16 to 19 Academy from being a children's home. These Regulations, that come into force on the 22nd May 2018, will allow a 16 to 19 Academy to be a children's home where that children's home is also approved by the Secretary of State to provide accommodation for the purpose of restricting the liberty of children and young people.

Minister sets out Welsh Government's approach to parental alienation (01/05/18)

A child should be entitled to a meaningful relationship with both parents following family separation where it is safe and in the child's best interests, the Minister for Children and Social Care has said.

There are occasions when one parent behaves in a way which creates anxiety in the child, so that it appears the child is opposed to living with or spending time with the other parent. This is often referred to as 'parental alienation'.

The Welsh Government recognises parental separation affects many children and their families. Where it is handled well, the adverse impact on children is minimised. To address this, the Welsh Government continues to place a firm focus on positive parenting and the provision of parenting support services are an integral part of the Families First and Flying Start programmes. Funding has been made available to up-skill the family support workforce, so they are better able to embed inter-parental support in their early intervention services for families.
