Background

Child Sexual Abuse (CSA) is when a child is forced or persuaded to take part in sexual activities, whether or not the child is aware of what is happening. The acts can be physical contacts, penetrative or non-penetrative. The child may not understand that they are being abuses and may not recognise it's wrong.

CSA can also include non-contact abuse such as involving a child or young person in looking at or being part of sexual online images, watching sexual acts or encouraging them to act sexually inappropriately. This also includes child sexual exploitation and grooming a child in preparation for abuse.

Perpetrators of Child Sexual Abuse are not easy to spot! They take advantage of any opportunity and they can take a lot of time to groom a child or family. 5-10% of all CSE is carried out by women.

Our childhood matters – it is important in its own right but it also shapes every aspect of our future lives. Child sexual abuse is one of the adverse childhood experiences, the impact can last a life time. A report reveals the vast majority of child sexual abuse (66%) takes place within the family or its trusted circle. There are additional barriers to children reporting this type of abuse resulting in most going unreported

Children and young people who have disabilities are at 3 an increased risk of being abused compared with their non-disabled peers. Sometimes there is a power imbalance. Peers can abuse each other too. Look out for Disabled Children they are more vulnerable to every form of abuse! Find out more
